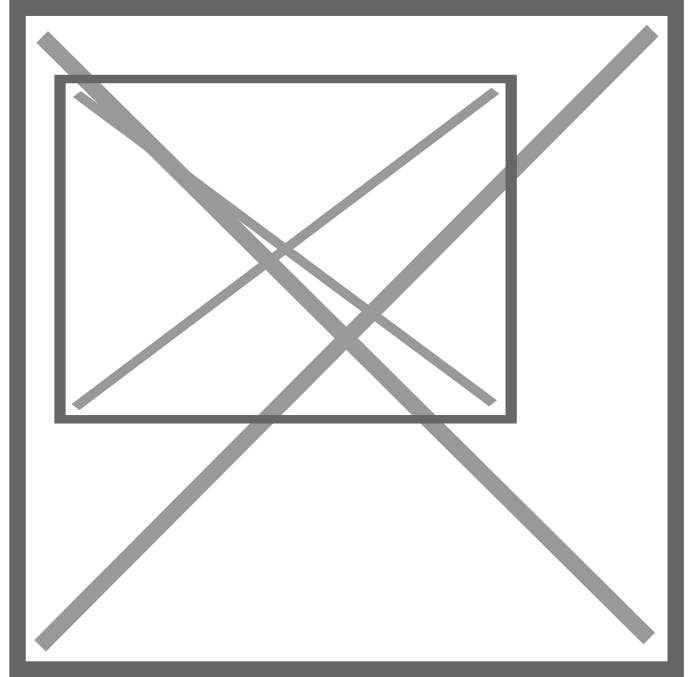


## Guards, Sunbeams ‘shine each day’
