AND THE SALVATION ARMY'S FIGHT AGAINST IT

- The Salvation Army is doubling its efforts to fight homelessness in the West.
- Hawaii has the highest rate of homelessness per capita in the U.S., according to federal statistics.
- Revolution Hawaii, a Salvation Army residential discipleship program for young adults, provides sandwiches as a weekly touchpoint for people living on the streets of paradise. The formula is simple in concept, easily replicated; the challenge comes in being faithful and consistent in execution. Only by showing up each week with an open and loving heart, can relationships form.

- A full 10 percent of the U.S. homeless population (nearly 53,000 people) lives in Los Angeles County.
- In 2017, Los Angeles County residents voted for Measure H, which will raise \$355 million annually for 10 years to combat homelessness.

- Revenue from L.A. County's Measure H funds will target four areas:
- Developing outreach teams to help homeless individuals with immediate needs and housing
- · Developing temporary housing solutions
- · Creating a rapid rehousing program
- Providing job training, substance abuse counseling and mental health treatment
- Each year in the U.S., The Salvation Army provides over 10 million nights of lodging to those in need. Across the West, The Salvation Army provides shelter to 5,800 people *every night*.
- But the efforts do not stop with a safe place to sleep. In El Cajon, California, for instance, a homeless reunification program launched soon after a \$10,000 grant from the local government and is helping people reunite with family members and sponsoring a one-way bus ticket to meet them.
